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INTRODUCTION AND SUMMARY

The City of Fairfield's Public Works Department's Transportation Division operates a transit system called FAST, which follows the Code of Federal of Regulations Title 49 CFR Part §26.45, which states that recipients who anticipate awarding more than \$250,000 in federally assisted contracts must set an overall goal for Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) participation. FAST will be completing three federally funded capital projects in the next 3-5 years, including:

- **Fueling** – FAST anticipates utilizing FTA funds to purchase fuel for its fleet before full electrification.
- **Corp Yard Charging Infrastructure** – The city will require new charging infrastructure at its Corp Maintenance Yard to charge and manage a new electric fleet.
- **Purchase of Five Battery Electric Vehicles** – These vehicles will continue the state-mandated fleet electrification.
- **Fairfield/Vacaville Hannigan Train Station Improvements** – The needed improvements including will assist riders transferring from or to the Capital Corridor system.

As a small operator, FAST will also use federal funds to offset operating contractor expenses. Small operators receiving Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds must comply with Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) program guidelines if they spend \$250,000 or more of FTA grant money on planning, capital, and operating activities. If such funds are used for in-house expenses like labor costs or purchasing new transit vehicles, participation in the DBE program may not be required. However, if a small operator uses more than \$250,000 of FTA money for activities other than labor costs and purchasing new transit vehicles — for example, contracting an outside party for a service — they must then participate in the DBE program.

FAST has established its DBE project goal based on its anticipated amount of DBE participation in the projects on contracting opportunities funded in whole or in part by FTA.

FAST's assessment of the scope of work on the projects includes a review of Census Bureau data, the California Unified Certification Program (CUCP) DBE database, and geographical markets relevant to FAST's contracting activities within Solano County and specifically in the City of Fairfield.

FAST proposes an overall DBE goal of 4.73% based on the projected availability of ready, willing, and able DBEs. Further details of how this goal was arrived is included on page 12.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The following 5 steps should be taken for the City of Fairfield to implement and manage its DBE program:

1. Post the policy statement included in Appendix A on the FAST website.
2. Establish a DBE liaison on staff. Note: the DBE liaison's role is not full-time, and the tasks of this position can be completed by a person holding another position.
3. Set and approve the DBE program goal for FY 2024-2026 (effective October 1, 2023-September 30, 2026). Based on the analysis contained herein the goal should be set at **4.73%** for all projects which have \$250,000 or more in federal funding included. The goals must be approved by the City Council.
4. Include contract provisions in all federal funded projects. The contract provisions are included in Appendix B of this document. Appendix C includes sample provisions that the City may use.
5. Include a "doing business with" section on the FAST website that includes the FAQs listed in Appendix E and the guiding principles included in the public participation section of this document.

DBE PROGRAM HISTORY

The history of the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) program is closely linked to the broader history of civil rights legislation and the promotion of equal opportunity in the United States. Here is a brief overview of the key milestones in the history of the FTA's DBE program:

- **Civil Rights Act of 1964:** The Civil Rights Act prohibited discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, or national origin in various areas, including employment and the use of federal funds. This laid the groundwork for future efforts to promote equal opportunity in federally funded programs, including public transportation projects.
- **Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) Program:** In the 1970s, the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) established the MBE program to promote the participation of minority-owned businesses in transportation projects. This program later evolved into the DBE program to include women-owned businesses and other socially and economically disadvantaged individuals.
- **Surface Transportation Assistance Act of 1982 (STAA):** The STAA introduced the DBE program and required states to set aside at least 10% of federal highway and transit funds for DBE firms. This marked the beginning of a formal DBE program within the FTA and other DOT agencies.
- **49 CFR Part 23 and Part 26:** In the 1990s, the DOT introduced regulations governing the DBE program, with 49 CFR Part 23 focusing on airports and 49 CFR Part 26 covering highway, transit, and transportation projects. These regulations provided the framework for DBE goal-setting, certification, and compliance.
- **Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program Improvement Act of 1998:** This legislation clarified and amended the DBE program, addressing issues related to good faith efforts, counting of DBE participation, and certification appeals.
- **The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987:** This act clarified that recipients of federal funds must ensure compliance with civil rights laws, including DBE regulations, in all of their programs and activities, not just those that receive federal funding.
- **Updates and revisions:** Over the years, the FTA and DOT have made numerous updates and revisions to the DBE program, including changes to the certification process, goal-setting methodology, and reporting requirements. These updates have sought to strengthen the program, address legal challenges, and improve overall effectiveness.

The FTA's DBE program has evolved over the years in response to changing legal, political, and social contexts. The program continues to play an essential role in promoting equal opportunity and increasing the participation of disadvantaged businesses in federally funded transportation projects.

ELEMENTS OF AN ESTABLISHED DBE PROGRAM

A Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) program is designed to provide equal opportunities for socially and economically disadvantaged businesses, including minority and women-owned businesses, to participate in public transportation projects. While specific requirements may vary depending on the jurisdiction or funding source, there are some common elements found in most DBE programs:

- **Policy statement:** A written commitment from the transit agency or recipient of federal funds stating their intention to promote the participation of DBEs in their projects and ensure nondiscrimination.
- **DBE Liaison Officer:** An individual appointed to oversee and administer the DBE program, ensuring compliance and coordinating efforts to promote DBE participation.
- **Certification:** A process to identify, verify, and certify eligible DBE firms, typically managed by a certifying agency like the state department of transportation or a unified certification program (UCP). For the City, certification is managed through the California Universal Certification Program (CAUCP), administered locally by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC).
- **Goals:** Establishing overall and project-specific goals for DBE participation, based on local market conditions, the availability of DBEs, and the capacity of those firms.
- **Good faith efforts:** Demonstrating that a contractor has made all necessary and reasonable efforts to achieve DBE participation, even if the goals are not met. This may include outreach, solicitation, and assistance to DBE firms.
- **Contract provisions:** Including clauses in contracts to ensure prime contractors are aware of DBE requirements and take necessary steps to include DBEs in their subcontracting opportunities.
- **Monitoring and enforcement:** Ensuring compliance with DBE requirements through regular reporting, audits, and on-site reviews of contractors and DBEs. Penalties may be imposed for non-compliance, such as withholding.

ROLE OF THE DBE LIAISON OFFICER

A Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Liaison Officer is a designated individual responsible for administering, overseeing, and coordinating the implementation of an organization's DBE program. The DBE Liaison Officer ensures compliance with federal, state, and local regulations related to DBE participation in transportation projects and other relevant contracts. Fairfield's designated DBE Liaison is Assistant City Engineer Jason Riley.

Key functions of a DBE Liaison Officer include:

- **Program administration:** Develop and implement policies, procedures, and guidelines to ensure the effective operation of the DBE program, in compliance with all applicable regulations.
- **Goal setting:** Assist in establishing overall and project-specific DBE participation goals, based on local market conditions, the availability of DBEs, and the capacity of those firms.
- **Certification:** Coordinate with the state's Unified Certification Program (UCP) or other relevant agencies to identify, verify, and certify eligible DBE firms.
- **Compliance monitoring:** Monitor and enforce compliance with DBE requirements in contracts, including prime contractors' good faith efforts, subcontractor selection and reporting, prompt payment, and retainage provisions.
- **Reporting:** Prepare and submit regular reports on DBE participation to the appropriate regulatory or funding agencies (e.g., the Federal Transit Administration), as well as internal stakeholders.
- **Training and capacity building:** Develop and implement training programs for staff involved in the procurement process to ensure they understand the DBE program requirements and their roles in its implementation.
- **Outreach and technical assistance:** Plan and organize outreach events, workshops, and other initiatives to inform DBEs of available opportunities, build their capacity, and encourage their participation in the organization's projects.
- **Stakeholder engagement:** Facilitate communication and collaboration with various stakeholders, including DBEs, community organizations, prime contractors, and government agencies, to ensure a successful and inclusive DBE program.
- **Record keeping:** Maintain comprehensive records related to the organization's DBE program, including goal-setting methodology, certification documentation, contract awards, and good faith efforts.

- **Program evaluation:** The Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) program, as outlined in 49 CFR Part 26, mandates that recipients of DOT funding set overall DBE goals triennially. These goals are based on local market conditions and represent a percentage of the total federal transportation dollars anticipated to be spent on contracts during the three years. Recipients are expected to strive to meet these goals annually within the triennial period. The regulation emphasizes that goals must not rely on a fixed percentage or past participation rates but should instead reflect current local market conditions and the availability of DBEs. Additionally, adjustments to these goals may be made if necessary, and recipients must analyze and improve their efforts if they fall short of meeting these goals.

By performing these functions, the DBE Liaison Officer helps create a level playing field for socially and economically disadvantaged businesses, promoting their participation in federally funded transportation projects and fostering a diverse and inclusive contracting environment.

DBE GOAL PLANNING AND ESTABLISHMENT

Setting a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) goal involves a series of steps that ensure the goal is reasonable, achievable, and aligned with the availability of DBEs in the local market. Here are the general steps to setting a DBE goal:

- **Assess the local market:** Conduct a thorough analysis of the local market to understand the availability of DBEs and their capacity to perform work on public transportation projects. This may involve examining industry data, reviewing historical DBE participation, and considering the size and nature of upcoming projects.
- **Determine the base figure:** Calculate a base figure representing the relative availability of DBEs in the relevant market. This is typically done by dividing the number of ready, willing, and able DBEs by the total number of all firms in the market that can potentially work on the projects.
- **Adjust the base figure:** If necessary, adjust the base figure to account for any factors that may affect the true availability of DBEs, such as capacity, historical participation, or barriers to entry. This can involve using data from disparity studies, surveys, or other relevant sources.
- **Set overall goal:** Establish an overall DBE participation goal for a specific time period (usually three years), which represents the percentage of the total contract dollars that should be awarded to DBEs. This goal should be based on the adjusted base figure and any other relevant factors.
- **Break down goals by project:** Divide the overall goal into project-specific goals, taking into account the scope, size, and duration of each project. This may involve setting different goals for various types of contracts, such as construction, professional services, or procurement.
- **Public participation and consultation:** Engage stakeholders, including DBEs, community organizations, and the general public, in the goal-setting process. This may involve public meetings, workshops, or online platforms for input and feedback.
- **Documentation and submission:** Document the goal-setting process, including the methodology used, adjustments made, and stakeholder input received. Submit the DBE goal to the appropriate regulatory or funding agency (such as the Federal Transit Administration) for approval.
- **Monitoring and reporting:** Regularly monitor progress towards meeting DBE goals, and report on the outcomes to the relevant authorities. Adjust the goals as needed based on the results of monitoring and any changes in the local market or project scope.

- **Good faith efforts:** Ensure that contractors demonstrate good faith efforts to achieve DBE participation, even if they are unable to meet the specific goal. This may involve outreach, solicitation, and assistance to DBE firms.

MARKET ASSESSMENT

By following these steps, public transportation agencies can set realistic and achievable DBE goals that promote equal opportunity and encourage the participation of disadvantaged businesses in their projects.

FAST followed the two-step goal-setting methodology prescribed in the United States Department of Transportation (DOT) regulation Title 49 CFR Part § 26.45 (c) (d) to determine the recommended project goal. The two steps for setting the goal are:

1. Establish a base figure for the relative availability of DBEs; and
2. Determine the base figure adjustment, if necessary.

BASE FIGURE DETERMINATION - SECTION 26.45(C)

Step one of the goal-setting process is to determine the base figure for the relative availability of DBEs based on evidence of ready, willing, and able DBEs in relationship to all comparable businesses known to be available to compete for the FTA-assisted project that FAST will begin awarding in 2023 for various packages representing, principally, professional services, design, and construction contracts.

IDENTIFY SCOPES OF WORK FOR FAST FEDERALLY FUNDED PROJECTS

To complete the planned projects, services procured include professional services, design, and construction opportunities. It should be noted that as a small operators, FAST does utilize a portion of federal funds for operating expenses. The following list of support work references only capital projects that are planned.

ESTABLISHING A CITY-SPECIFIC DBE GOAL

To find Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) in Solano County, California, the City has followed these steps:

- Research California Unified Certification Program (CUCP) DBE Directory: The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) is part of the California Unified Certification Program (CUCP), which maintains a directory of certified DBEs in the state. Visit the Caltrans Civil Rights DBE Search page at <https://caltrans.dbesystem.com>.
- Search for DBEs: On the DBE Search page, the search was filtered by entering relevant keywords or business names, selecting the "Work Codes" that apply to the services being procured, and choosing "Solano" in the "County" dropdown menu. This will display a list of certified DBE firms in Solano County that match the criteria requested.
- Obtain contact information and services provided: Once the DBEs in Solano County have been identified, the relevant contact information has been input into the database in Appendix D. This information can be used to reach out to the firms for potential collaboration or subcontracting opportunities.
- In addition to the CUCP DBE Directory, the City has also explored local business directories and chambers of commerce, and will host networking events and conferences to identify and connect with DBE firms in Solano County.

The directory was queried for all certified firms able to do business within 50 miles of Solano County. Based on this search result 25 firms were found, of these 25, 20 are able to complete various functions on the projects the City envisions completing in the next 3-5 years. The list of potential DBE firms is included in Appendix C.

In our assessment of the local market there were approximately 428 firms within 10 miles that are able to complete tasks associated with the projects the City envisions. The list of firms is included as Appendix D.

Utilizing this data, and applying the FTA's goal setting criteria, the following statistics were utilized to establish the DBE goal:

Determine the base figure – 20 DBE firms were identified within 50 miles of Solano County that are capable of completing the capital projects described in this plan.

Understand the total market of available businesses – In all, 428 firms within Solano County were identified.

Given the small size of potential DBE bidders, no consideration was given to race-conscious goal setting. As this is not required, this plan proposes setting only a race-neutral goal.

Using best practices, this provides for a goal of **4.73%** for the City’s projects.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AND CONSULTATION

OVERVIEW

A Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) public participation plan is important because it helps create transparency, inclusivity, and accountability in the DBE program. By involving various stakeholders, such as DBEs, prime contractors, community organizations, and the general public, a public participation plan can help ensure the program's success and address the needs of the local community. - 4. Community involvement:** By involving the community in the development, implementation, and assessment of the DBE program, public participation helps ensure that the program is responsive to local needs and priorities. This can lead to more successful projects and outcomes that benefit the entire community.
- 5. Capacity building:** Public participation can help build the capacity of DBEs and other stakeholders by providing information, resources, and support. This can include technical assistance, training, and networking opportunities, which can help DBEs grow and compete more effectively in the marketplace.
- 6. Continuous improvement:** Engaging stakeholders in the DBE program allows for continuous feedback and improvement. Public input can help identify best practices, innovative approaches, and new ideas that can enhance the program's overall effectiveness and responsiveness.

A DBE public participation plan is important because it promotes transparency, inclusivity, accountability, and continuous improvement in the DBE program. By engaging stakeholders and involving the community, public participation helps ensure that the program is responsive to local needs and priorities, which can lead to more successful projects and outcomes for disadvantaged businesses and the entire community.

ELEMENTS OF A DBE PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PLAN

The City of Fairfield’s DBE public participation plan should outline the strategies and activities that an organization will undertake to engage stakeholders and involve the community in the development, implementation, and assessment of its DBE program. The elements of the plan may vary depending on the organization and its specific goals, but generally include the following components:

- 1. Objectives:** Clearly define the objectives of the public participation plan, such as increasing transparency, promoting inclusivity, ensuring accountability, and fostering community involvement in the DBE program.
- 2. Stakeholder identification:** Identify the key stakeholders who should be engaged in the DBE public participation process, such as DBEs, prime contractors, subcontractors, community organizations, government agencies, and the general public.
- 3. Communication and outreach strategies:** Develop strategies for communicating with stakeholders and informing them about the DBE program, its goals, and opportunities for participation. This may include public meetings, workshops, webinars, social media, email updates, newsletters, and other channels.
- 4. Public input opportunities:** Provide opportunities for stakeholders to provide input and feedback on the DBE program, such as public comment periods, surveys, focus groups, or advisory committees.
- 5. Capacity building and technical assistance:** Outline plans for providing technical assistance, training, and resources to DBEs and other stakeholders to help them participate effectively in the DBE program and procurement process.
- 6. Partnerships and collaboration:** Establish partnerships with relevant organizations, such as community groups, business associations, and government agencies, to expand the reach and impact of the public participation plan.

7. **Evaluation and monitoring:** Develop a process for evaluating the effectiveness of the public participation plan and monitoring its implementation, including feedback mechanisms and performance metrics.
8. **Timeline and milestones:** Establish a timeline for the public participation plan, including key milestones and target dates for the completion of specific activities and objectives.
9. **Budget and resources:** Identify the resources needed to implement the public participation plan, such as staff time, financial resources, and materials, and develop a budget to support these activities.
10. **Documentation and reporting:** Ensure that all public participation activities, input, and outcomes are documented and reported to relevant stakeholders, including the organization's management, funding agencies, and the public.

By incorporating these elements into a DBE public participation plan, organizations can create a comprehensive and effective framework for engaging stakeholders, fostering community involvement, and promoting transparency, inclusivity, and accountability in their DBE program.

APPENDIX A – POLICY STATEMENT

A Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) policy statement is a written commitment by a transit agency, government organization, or other recipient of federal funds to provide equal opportunities for DBEs in their projects and ensure nondiscrimination. Below is an example of a DBE policy statement:

SAMPLE STATEMENT

City of Fairfield Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Policy Statement

The City of Fairfield is committed to promoting equal opportunities for Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) and ensuring nondiscrimination in the award and administration of federally funded contracts. In accordance with Title 49 CFR Part 26, City of Fairfield will implement a DBE program to create a level playing field and foster a diverse and inclusive contracting environment for socially and economically disadvantaged businesses, including minority-owned and women-owned businesses.

To achieve these objectives, the City of Fairfield will:

- Ensure nondiscrimination in the selection and award of contracts to DBEs and prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, or other protected categories in all aspects of its procurement process.*
- Set annual overall DBE participation goals based on the availability of ready, willing, and able DBEs in the relevant market, and develop strategies to achieve these goals.*
- Provide opportunities for DBEs to compete fairly for contracts and subcontracts in federally funded projects by breaking down tasks into smaller, more manageable components, and by ensuring prompt payment and fair treatment of DBE subcontractors.*
- Monitor and enforce compliance with DBE requirements in all contracts, including prime contractors' good faith efforts to achieve DBE participation and subcontractor selection and reporting.*
- Establish a DBE Liaison Officer responsible for administering the DBE program and ensuring compliance with all applicable regulations.*
- Maintain a certification process to identify, verify, and certify eligible DBE firms in partnership with the state's Unified Certification Program (UCP).*
- Engage stakeholders, including DBEs, community organizations, and the general public, in the development, implementation, and assessment of the DBE program.*
- Ensure all staff involved in the procurement process are trained and familiar with the DBE program requirements and their role in its implementation.*

The City of Fairfield is committed to the success of the DBE program and will take all necessary steps to ensure its effective implementation, compliance with federal regulations, and the promotion of equal opportunities for DBEs in its procurement activities.

APPENDIX B – FTA CONTRACT PROVISIONS

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) requires recipients of FTA funds to include specific Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) provisions in their contracts to ensure compliance with DBE regulations and promote participation of DBEs in FTA-funded projects. These provisions may vary depending on the specific project and funding program, but generally include the following elements:

1. **DBE Participation Goal:** Clearly state the DBE participation goal for the project, either as a percentage of the total contract value or as a specific dollar amount. This goal should be based on the recipient's overall DBE goal, project-specific considerations, and the availability of DBEs.
2. **Good Faith Efforts:** Require prime contractors to demonstrate that they have made good faith efforts to meet the DBE participation goal. This may involve providing documentation of outreach, solicitation, and assistance provided to DBE firms, as well as any efforts to break down work into smaller, more manageable tasks for DBEs.
3. **DBE Certification:** Specify that only firms certified as DBEs by the recipient's state Unified Certification Program (UCP) or another approved certifying agency will count towards the DBE participation goal.
4. **Subcontractor Selection and Reporting:** Require prime contractors to provide information on the DBE firms they plan to use as subcontractors, including the scope of work, contract value, and expected start and end dates. Prime contractors should also be required to report any changes to their DBE subcontractors during the course of the project and obtain approval from the recipient for any substitutions.
5. **Prompt Payment and Retainage:** Include provisions to ensure that prime contractors promptly pay their DBE subcontractors and suppliers, as well as any provisions related to retainage (the portion of payment withheld until satisfactory completion of work). This helps ensure that DBE firms have the cash flow necessary to maintain their operations during the project.
6. **Contract Assurance:** Include a contract clause stating that the prime contractor and its subcontractors are required to comply with all applicable DBE regulations and that failure to do so may result in penalties or contract termination.
7. **Monitoring and Enforcement:** Specify the recipient's responsibility to monitor and enforce compliance with DBE requirements, including regular reporting, audits, and on-site reviews of contractors and DBEs.

8. Record Keeping and Reporting: Require prime contractors to maintain records related to their DBE subcontractors, including contracts, invoices, and payment documentation. Prime contractors should also be required to submit regular progress reports on their DBE participation to the recipient.

By including these provisions in FTA-funded contracts, recipients can help ensure that prime contractors are aware of their DBE obligations and are taking the necessary steps to meet the established goals and comply with DBE regulations.

APPENDIX C – SAMPLE FEDERAL PROVISIONS FOR PROCUREMENTS

FR 1. ACCESS TO RECORDS

The Contractor agrees to maintain all books, records, accounts and reports required under this Contract for a period of not less than three years after the date of termination or expiration of this Contract, except in the event of litigation or settlement of claims arising from the performance of this Contract, in which case Contractor agrees to maintain same until the Agency, the FTA Administrator, the Comptroller General or any of their duly authorized representatives have disposed of all such litigation, appeals, claims or exceptions related thereto. Reference 49 CFR 18.39(i)(11).

The following access to records requirements apply to this Contract:

FR 1.1 Local Governments

In accordance with 49 CFR 18.36(i), the Contractor agrees to provide the Agency, the FTA Administrator, the Comptroller General of the United States or any of their authorized representatives access to any books, documents, papers and records of the Contractor that are directly pertinent to this Contract for the purposes of making audits, examinations, excerpts and transcriptions. Contractor also agrees, pursuant to 49 CFR 633.17 to provide the FTA Administrator or his authorized representatives including any PMO Contractor access to Contractor's records and construction sites pertaining to a major capital project, defined at 49 USC 5302(a)1, which is receiving federal financial assistance through the programs described at 49 USC 5307, 5309 or 5311.

FR 1.2 State Governments

In accordance with 49 CFR 633.17, the Contractor agrees to provide the Agency, the FTA Administrator or his authorized representatives, including any PMO Contractor, access to the Contractor's records and construction sites pertaining to a major capital project, defined at 49 USC 5302(a)1, which is receiving federal financial assistance through the programs described at 49 USC 5307, 5309 or 5311. By definition, a major capital project excludes contracts of less than the simplified acquisition threshold currently set at \$100,000.

The Contractor agrees to permit any of the foregoing parties to reproduce by any means whatsoever or to copy excerpts and transcriptions as reasonably needed.

FR 2. FEDERAL FUNDING, INCORPORATION OF FTA TERMS AND FEDERAL CHANGES

The preceding provisions include, in part, certain standard terms and conditions required by the Department of Transportation, whether or not expressly set forth in the preceding Contract provisions. All contractual provisions required by DOT, as set forth in FTA Circular 4220.1F or its successors are hereby incorporated by reference. Anything to the contrary herein notwithstanding, all FTA mandated terms shall be deemed to control in the event of a conflict with other provisions contained in this agreement. The Contractor shall not perform any act, fail to perform any act or refuse to comply with any City of Fairfield requests that would cause City of Fairfield to be in violation of the FTA terms and conditions.

The Contractor shall at all times comply with all applicable FTA regulations, policies, procedures and directives, including without limitation those listed directly or by reference in the Master Agreement between Agency and FTA, as they may be amended or promulgated from time to time during the term of this Contract. Contractor's failure to so comply shall constitute a material breach of this Contract.

FR 3. FEDERAL ENERGY CONSERVATION REQUIREMENTS

The Contractor agrees to comply with mandatory standards and policies relating to energy efficiency that are contained in the state energy conservation plan issued in compliance with the Energy Policy and Conservation Act.

FR 4. CIVIL RIGHTS REQUIREMENTS

The following requirements apply to the underlying Contract:

- 1. Nondiscrimination:** In accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act, as amended, 42 USC § 2000d, section 303 of the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended, 42 USC § 6102, section 202 of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, 42 USC § 12132, and federal transit law at 49 USC § 5332, the Contractor agrees that it will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, age, or disability. In addition, the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable federal implementing regulations and other implementing requirements FTA may issue.
- 2. Equal Employment Opportunity:** The following equal employment opportunity requirements apply to the underlying Contract:

- a. Race, Color, Creed, National Origin, Sex:** In accordance with Title VII of the Civil Rights Act, as amended, 42 USC § 2000e, and federal transit laws at 49 USC § 5332, the Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable equal employment opportunity requirements of U.S. Department of Labor (U.S. DOL) regulations, “Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor,” 41 CFR Parts 60 *et seq.*, (which implement Executive Order No. 11246, “Equal Employment Opportunity,” as amended by Executive Order No. 11375, “Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,” 42 USC § 2000e note), and with any applicable federal statutes, executive orders, regulations, and federal policies that may in the future affect construction activities undertaken in the course of the Project. The Contractor agrees to take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, creed, national origin, sex, or age. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. In addition, the Contractor agrees to comply with any implementing requirements FTA may issue.
 - b. Age:** In accordance with section 4 of the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967, as amended, 29 USC §§ 623 and federal transit law at 49 USC § 5332, the Contractor agrees to refrain from discrimination against present and prospective employees for reason of age. In addition, the Contractor agrees to comply with any implementing requirements FTA may issue.
 - c. Disabilities:** In accordance with section 102 of the Americans with Disabilities Act, as amended, 42 USC § 12112, the Contractor agrees that it will comply with the requirements of U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, “Regulations to Implement the Equal Employment Provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act,” 29 CFR Part 1630, pertaining to employment of persons with disabilities. In addition, the Contractor agrees to comply with any implementing requirements FTA may issue.
3. The Contractor also agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract financed in whole or in part with federal assistance provided by FTA, modified only if necessary to identify the affected parties.

FR 5. NO GOVERNMENT OBLIGATION TO THIRD PARTIES

1. The Agency and Contractor acknowledge and agree that, notwithstanding any concurrence by the federal government in or approval of the Solicitation or award of the underlying Contract, absent the express written consent by the federal government, the federal government is not a party to this Contract and shall not be subject to any obligations or liabilities to the Agency, Contractor, or any other party (whether or not a party to that Contract) pertaining to any matter resulting from the underlying Contract.
2. The Contractor agrees to include the above clause in each subcontract financed in whole or in part with federal assistance provided by FTA. It is further agreed that the clause shall not be modified, except to identify the Subcontractor who will be subject to its provisions.

FR 6. PROGRAM FRAUD AND FALSE OR FRAUDULENT STATEMENTS OR RELATED ACTS

1. The Contractor acknowledges that the provisions of the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986, as amended, 31 USC §§ 3801 *et seq.* and U.S. DOT regulations, “Program Fraud Civil Remedies,” 49 CFR Part 31, apply to its actions pertaining to this Project. Upon execution of the underlying Contract, the Contractor certifies or affirms the truthfulness and accuracy of any statement it has made, it makes, it may make, or it causes to be made, pertaining to the underlying Contract or the FTA-assisted project for which this Contract Work is being performed. In addition to other penalties that may be applicable, the Contractor further acknowledges that if it makes, or causes to be made, a false, fictitious or fraudulent claim, statement, submission or certification, the federal government reserves the right to impose the penalties of the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986 on the Contractor to the extent the federal government deems appropriate.
2. The Contractor also acknowledges that if it makes, or causes to be made, a false, fictitious, or fraudulent claim, statement, submission, or certification to the federal government under a Contract connected with a project that is financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance originally awarded by FTA under the authority of 49 USC § 5307, the government reserves the right to impose the penalties of 18 USC § 1001 and 49 USC § 5307(n)(1) on the Contractor, to the extent the federal government deems appropriate.
3. The Contractor agrees to include the above two clauses in each subcontract financed in whole or in part with federal assistance provided by FTA. It is further agreed that the clauses shall not be modified, except to identify the Subcontractor who will be subject to the provisions.

FR 7. SUSPENSION AND DEBARMENT

This Contract is a covered transaction for purposes of 49 CFR Part 29. As such, the Contractor is required to verify that none of the Contractor, its principals, as defined at 49 CFR 29.995, or affiliates, as defined at 49 CFR 29.905, are excluded or disqualified as defined at 49 CFR 29.940 and 29.945.

The Contractor is required to comply with 49 CFR 29, Subpart C, and must include the requirement to comply with 49 CFR 29, Subpart C, in any lower tier covered transaction it enters into.

By signing and submitting its bid or Proposal, the Bidder or Proposer certifies as follows:

The certification in this clause is a material representation of fact relied upon by City of Fairfield. If it is later determined that the Bidder or Proposer knowingly rendered an erroneous certification, in addition to remedies available to City of Fairfield, the federal government may pursue available remedies, including but not limited to suspension and/or debarment. The Bidder or Proposer agrees to comply with the requirements of 49 CFR 29, Subpart C, while this Proposal is valid and throughout the period of any Contract that may arise from this Proposal. The Bidder or Proposer further agrees to include a provision requiring such compliance in its lower tier covered transactions.

FR 8. DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (DBE)

This Contract is subject to the requirements of Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 26, Participation by Disadvantaged Business Enterprises in Department of Transportation Financial Assistance Programs.

The Contractor shall maintain compliance with “DBE Approval Certification” throughout the period of Contract performance.

The Contractor shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the performance of this Contract. The Contractor shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR Part 26 in the award and administration of this DOT-assisted Contract. Failure by the Contractor to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this Contract, which may result in the termination of this Contract or such other remedy as City of Fairfield deems appropriate. Each subcontract the Contractor signs with a Subcontractor must include the assurance in this paragraph (see 49 CFR 26.13(b)).

FR 9. CLEAN WATER REQUIREMENTS

1. The Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 USC 1251 *et seq.* The Contractor agrees to report each violation to the Agency and understands and agrees that the Agency will, in turn, report each violation as required to ensure notification to FTA and the appropriate EPA Regional Office.
2. The Contractor also agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$100,000 financed in whole or in part with federal assistance provided by FTA.

FR 10. CLEAN AIR REQUIREMENTS

1. The Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 USC §§ 7401 *et seq.* The Contractor agrees to report each violation to the Agency and understands and agrees that the Agency will, in turn, report each violation as required to ensure notification to FTA and the appropriate EPA Regional Office.
2. The Contractor also agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$100,000 financed in whole or in part with federal assistance provided by FTA.

FR 11. COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL LOBBYING POLICY

Contractors who apply or bid for an award of \$100,000 or more shall file the certification required by 49 CFR Part 20, “New Restrictions on Lobbying.” Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any Agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any federal Contract, grant or any other award covered by 31 USC 1352. Each tier shall also disclose the name of any registrant under the Lobbying Disclosure Act of 1995 who has made lobbying contacts on its behalf with non-federal funds with respect to that federal Contract, grant or award covered by 31 USC 1352. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the recipient.

FR 12. BUY AMERICA

The Contractor agrees to comply with 49 USC 5323(j) and 49 CFR Part 661, which provide that federal funds may not be obligated unless steel, iron and manufactured products used in FTA-funded projects are produced in the United States, unless a waiver has been granted by FTA or the product is subject to a general waiver.

General waivers are listed in 49 CFR 661.7.A general public interest waiver from the Buy America requirements applies to microprocessors, computers, microcomputers, software or other such devices, which are used solely for the purpose of processing or storing data. This general waiver does not extend to a product or device that merely contains a microprocessor or microcomputer and is not used solely for the purpose of processing or storing data.

Separate requirements for rolling stock are set out at 49 USC 5323(j)(2)(C) and 49 CFR 661.11. Rolling stock must be assembled in the United States and have a 60 percent domestic content.

A Bidder or Proposer must submit to the Agency the appropriate Buy America Certification with all offers on FTA-funded contracts, except those subject to a general waiver. Proposals that are not accompanied by a properly completed Buy America certification are subject to the provisions of 49 CFR 661.13 and may be rejected as nonresponsive.

FR 13. TESTING OF NEW BUS MODELS

The Contractor agrees to comply with 49 USCA 5323(c) and FTA's implementing regulation at 49 CFR Part 665 and shall perform the following:

1. A manufacturer of a new bus model or a bus produced with a major change in components or configuration shall provide a copy of the final test report to the recipient at a point in the procurement process specified by the recipient, which will be prior to the recipient's final acceptance of the first vehicle.
2. A manufacturer who releases a report under paragraph 1 above shall provide notice to the operator of the testing facility that the report is available to the public.
3. If the manufacturer represents that the vehicle was previously tested, the vehicle being sold should have the identical configuration and major components as the vehicle in the test report, which must be provided to the recipient prior to recipient's final acceptance of the first vehicle. If the configuration or components are not identical, the manufacturer shall provide a description of the change and the manufacturer's basis for concluding that it is not a major change requiring additional testing.
4. If the manufacturer represents that the vehicle is "grandfathered" (has been used in mass transit service in the United States before Oct. 1, 1988, and is currently being produced without a major change in configuration or components), the manufacturer shall provide the name and address of the recipient of such a vehicle and the details of that vehicle's configuration and major components.

FR 14. PRE-AWARD AND POST-DELIVERY AUDITS

The Contractor agrees to comply with 49 USC § 5323(l) and FTA's implementing regulation at 49 CFR Part 663 and to submit the following certifications:

1. Buy America requirements: The Contractor shall complete and submit a declaration certifying either compliance or noncompliance with Buy America. If the recommended Bidder/Proposer certifies compliance with Buy America, it shall submit documentation that lists (1) component and subcomponent parts of the rolling stock to be purchased identified by manufacturer of the parts, their country of origin and costs; and (2) the location of the final assembly point for the rolling stock, including a description of the activities that will take place at the final assembly point and the cost of final assembly.
2. Solicitation specification requirements: The Contractor shall submit evidence that it will be capable of meeting the bid specifications.
3. Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards (FMVSS): The Contractor shall submit (1) manufacturer's FMVSS self-certification, Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards, that the vehicle complies with relevant FMVSS or (2) manufacturer's certified statement that the contracted buses will not be subject to FMVSS regulations.

FR 15. CARGO PREFERENCE

The Contractor agrees to the following:

- To use privately owned U.S.-flag commercial vessels to ship at least fifty (50) percent of the gross tonnage (computed separately for dry bulk carriers, dry cargo liners and tankers) involved, whenever shipping any equipment, material or commodities pursuant to the underlying Contract to the extent such vessels are available at fair and reasonable rates for U.S.-flag commercial vessels.
- To furnish within twenty (20) working days following the date of loading for shipments originating within the United States or within thirty (30) working days following the date of leading for shipments originating outside the United States, a legible copy of a rated, “onboard” commercial ocean bill of lading in English for each shipment of cargo described in the preceding paragraph to the Division of National Cargo, Office of Market Development, Maritime Administration, Washington, DC 20590 and to the FTA recipient (through the Contractor in the case of a Subcontractor’s bill-of- lading.)
- To include these requirements in all subcontracts issued pursuant to this Contract when the subcontract may involve the transport of equipment, material or commodities by ocean vessel.
- FR 16. Fly America
- The Contractor agrees to comply with 49 USC 40118 (the “Fly America” Act) in accordance with the General Services Administration’s regulations at 41 CFR Part 301-10, which provide that recipients and sub-recipients of federal funds and their Contractors are required to use U.S. flag air carriers for U.S. government-financed international air travel and transportation of their personal effects or property, to the extent such service is available, unless travel by foreign air carrier is a matter of necessity, as defined by the Fly America Act. The Contractor shall submit, if a foreign air carrier was used, an appropriate certification or memorandum adequately explaining why service by a U.S.-flag air carrier was not available or why it was necessary to use a foreign air carrier and shall, in any event, provide a certificate of compliance with the Fly America requirements. The Contractor agrees to include the requirements of this section in all subcontracts that may involve international air transportation.

FR 17. CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT

- 1. Overtime requirements:** No Contractor or Subcontractor contracting for any part of the Contract Work that may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic in any workweek in which he or she is employed on such Work to work in excess of 40 hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in such workweek.
- 2. Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages:** In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in paragraph 1 of this section, the Contractor and any Subcontractor responsible therefore shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such Contractor and Subcontractor shall be liable to the United States for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in paragraph 1 of this section, in the sum of \$10 for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of 40 hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in paragraph 1 of this section.
- 3. Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages:** The Agency shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any monies payable on account of work performed by the Contractor or Subcontractor under any such contract or any other federal contract with the same Prime Contractor, or any other federally assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same Prime Contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such Contractor or Subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph 2 of this section.
- 4. Subcontracts:** The Contractor or Subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in paragraphs 1 through 4 of this section and also a clause requiring the Subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower-tier subcontracts. The Prime Contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any Subcontractor or lower-tier Subcontractor with the clauses set forth in paragraphs 1 through 4 of this section.

APPENDIX E – DBE FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

DISCLAIMER: These questions and answers, in conjunction with the provisions under 49 CFR, Part 26, provide guidance and information pertaining to the implementation of the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program. These questions and answers are not, in themselves, legally binding and do not supplement the regulations. They are issued to provide an acceptable means, but not the only means, of clarifying compliance requirements with Part 26. While these questions and answers do not supplement the regulations, they are derived from extensive U.S. Department of Transportation (U.S. DOT), recipient, and contractor input concerning the determination of compliance with Part 26.

1. What is a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE)?

A DBE is a for-profit small business concern that is at least 51 percent owned by one or more individual(s) who are both socially and economically disadvantaged. For example, in the case of a corporation, such individuals must own at least 51 percent of the each class of voting stock outstanding and 51 percent of the aggregate of all stock outstanding. Also, the management and daily business operations of a DBE business must be controlled by one or more of the socially and economically disadvantaged individuals who own it.

2. What is the California Unified Certification Program (CUCP)?

The CUCP was developed under a mutual agreement between certifying agencies within the State of California, creating a “one-stop shopping” for DBE certification in California. While Caltrans’ Certification Branch certifies eligible firms throughout the State, there are other agencies which provide DBE certification in their geographic area. These include City of Los Angeles, Los Angeles Metropolitan Transportation Authority, Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART), and the City of Fresno, to name a few. A full list is available on the certification website at: <https://dot.ca.gov/programs/civil-rights/dbe>.

3. What are the DBE Program objectives?

The DBE Program objectives are:

- To ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of federally-funded contracts in transit financial assistance programs.
- To create a level-playing field on which DBEs can compete fairly for federally-funded contracts.
- To ensure the DBE Program is narrowly tailored in accordance with applicable law.

- To ensure that only firms that fully meet this part’s eligibility standards are permitted to participate as DBEs.
- To help remove barriers to the participation of DBEs in federally-funded contracts; to assist the development of firms that can compete successfully in the marketplace outside the DBE Program. To promote the use of DBEs in all types of federally-assisted contracts and procurement activities conducted by recipients.
- To provide appropriate flexibility to recipients of federal financial assistance in establishing and providing opportunities for DBEs.

4. What are the criteria for DBE certification?

Eligibility requirements for certification as a DBE are stated in 49 CFR, Part 26, Subpart D-Certification Standards. The following six requirements must be proved by a DBE applicant, but does not cover all the requirements found in 49 CFR, Part 26.

Social and Economic Disadvantage: A disadvantaged owner must be a U.S. Citizen (or resident alien) and meet the Federal definition of socially and economically disadvantaged as defined in 49 CFR, Part 26.67. Presumptive groups include women, Black Americans, Hispanic Americans, Native Americans, Asian-Pacific Americans, Subcontinent Asian-Americans, or other minorities found to be disadvantaged by the regulations, or any individual found to be socially and economically disadvantaged on a case-by-case basis.

Rules to determine social and economic disadvantage also include extending the treatment of assets held by married couples to include domestic partnerships and civil unions that are legally recognized under state law. It also codifies guidance regarding the treatment of assets transferred to an immediate family member, or to a trust a beneficiary of which is an immediate family member, for less than fair market value, within two years prior to the submission of an application for certification or within two years of a participant’s annual program review.

- **Personal Net Worth:** Only disadvantaged persons having a personal net worth (PNW) of less than \$1,320,000 can be considered as a potential qualified DBE. Items excluded from a person’s net worth calculation include an individual’s ownership interest in the applicant’s firm, and his or her equity in their primary residence. Also, if an individual demonstrates that he/she is able to accumulate substantial wealth, the individual’s claim of economic disadvantage may be denied, even though the individual’s PNW is less than \$1.32 million.
- **Business Size Standard:** A firm (including affiliates) must be a small business as defined by the Small Business Administration (SBA). It must not have annual gross receipts over \$23,980,000 in the previous three fiscal years (\$56,420,000 for airport concessions in general with some exceptions). Depending on the type of work the business performs, other lower size standards may apply

- **Ownership:** Must be a for-profit small business where socially and economically disadvantaged individuals own at least 51 percent interest and control management AND daily business operations; ownership cannot be in name only.
- **Independence:** The business must not be affiliated with another firm in such a way as to compromise its independence and control. These include, but are not limited to, such areas as personnel, facilities, equipment, financial and/or bonding support, and other resources. This means a business should be operational on its own, without support beyond what is applicable under normal industry standards.
- **Management and Control:** The socially and economically DBE owner(s) must possess the power to direct or cause the direction to the management and policies of the firm and to make day-to-day decisions, as well as long-term decisions on matters of management, policy and operations. Any delegation of duties must be revocable and where state law requires the owner to have a particular license or other credential in order to own and/or control a certain type of firm, then the socially and economically disadvantaged persons who own and control a potential DBE firm of that type must possess the required license or credential. A mere change in business structure to meet DBE requirements may not be sufficient to prove management and control.

5. How can I prove my group membership?

Any of the following documentation which indicates group membership will be considered: your birth certificate, your parent's or grandparent's birth certificate, naturalization papers, passport, military discharge paper (D.D. 214), tribal role card or registration with the United Indian Development Association and any other documentation that provides evidence of group membership. However, if you do not have any of the proceeding documentation as evidence of group membership, you will have to submit one (1) notarized statement from a relevant community organization attesting that you are regarded as a member of the group and stating how long you have been regarded as a member of that particular group. Group membership cannot be claimed solely upon being born in a certain country; and personal photographs are not acceptable as evidence of group membership. Any documents presented as evidence of group membership in a language other than English, must be translated and notarized.

6. If I do not fall within the presumptive groups, can I still be considered a DBE?

Yes, but you must prove by providing documentary evidence that you are socially and economically disadvantaged as stated in 49 CFR, Part 26, Appendix E. Socially and economically disadvantaged individual means any individual who is a U.S. citizen (or lawfully admitted permanent resident) and who meets the criteria based on 49 CFR, Part 26, and any individual found to be socially and economically disadvantaged on a case-by-case basis. In every case, consideration is given to education, employment and business history to prove disadvantage in entering into or advancing in the business world.

7. Which business owner should complete the Personal Financial Statement (PFS)?

The majority disadvantaged owner(s) whose ownership and control is/are being relied upon for DBE certification should complete a PFS. Usually, this is the person who owns 51 percent or more of the firm. If two disadvantaged owners make up a majority of 51 percent ownership, both will be required to complete the PFS. For example, if Owner A owns 33 percent, Owner B owns 33 percent, and Owner C owns 34 percent, the two disadvantaged owners whose ownership and control is being relied upon must complete the PFS.

8. When completing the PFS, should I include my primary residence even though it is excluded from the net worth calculations?

Yes, you must indicate the current market value of your primary residence on Page 2 of the PFS form together with any debt you owe against it. However, do not include the present market value or mortgage amount of your primary residence on summary Page 1 of the PFS.

9. Why is it required to have an on-site evaluation of my business?

It is a regulatory requirement. The Federal regulations state in 49, CFR, Part 26.83, Subpart C, Section 1: "... you must perform an on-site visit to the offices of the firm. You must interview the principal officers of the firm and review their resumes and/or work histories. You must also perform an on-site visit to job sites if there are such sites on which the firm is working at the time of the eligibility investigation in your jurisdiction or local area. You may rely upon the site visit report of any other recipient with respect to a firm applying for certification."

10. Once my business is DBE certified, does the certification expire?

No. DBE certification does not expire. Once your business is certified as a DBE, it shall remain certified until and unless your certification is, in whole or in part, removed a due process. You are required to update your records with your certifying authority annually by completing an Annual Update Affidavit (AUA), and also during a 5th Year AUA process. The affidavit must affirm there have been no changes in the firm's circumstances affecting its ability to meet size standards, disadvantaged status, and ownership or control requirements. This update requires you to submit the most recent business and personal taxes (signed copy). During the 5th Year AUA review, we may ask you to update your Personal Financial Statement as well. Failure to comply with the AUA requirement will lead to a firm being suspended, with further action taken to remove the business from the program.

11. What is the determination on the eligibility of firms owned by an Indian tribe?

Any Indian tribe may own a DBE firm as an entity, however, the firm MUST be controlled by socially and economically disadvantaged individuals. The control requirement is the disadvantaged individuals involved with controlling the firm must meet personal net worth standards. Not every Indian tribe member must meet this requirement, but only the disadvantaged officers, board members, CEO, etc who actually control the firm must do so.

The issue of control is defined in 49 CFR, Part 26.71. The firm must also comply with the regulations regarding size standards, ownership, and independence.

12. I'm an out-of-state business and currently seeking work in California; can I be certified as a DBE?

Yes, however, your firm must first be DBE certified in your home state. You must complete the appropriate application in the state you reside. For example, if your firm is based in Arizona, you must proceed through Arizona's DBE certification process before seeking work as a DBE in California. Once you are certified as a DBE in your home state, you can then apply for certification in California and a California certifying agency can request the onsite report from Arizona's DBE agency. The certification process is complete under the provision of 49 CFR, Part 26.85, Interstate certification. Out-of-state businesses must submit a complete package of all the documents submitted to their home state to date.

13. Is there a cost to the applicant for the certification process?

No. The only cost associated with certification is for notarizing the application and the cost of postage.

14. I have questions regarding the DBE application; who can I contract for assistance?

There are detailed instructions attached to the application packet on how to complete the forms, however, if you still have additional questions, our friendly certification analysts are here to assist you with your Caltrans DBE application. Just call and ask for the Analyst of the Day, Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., PST, at (916) 324-1700. (If you do not have a DBE application, you may obtain the application at <https://dot.ca.gov/programs/civil-rights/dbe-certification-information>.)

15. What are my appeal rights if I am denied DBE certification?

You may appeal a decision if you feel all the facts have not been duly considered. To do so, please respond in writing within 90 days from the date of your denial letter to:

You must include in your letter of appeal a statement that specifies why the certification decision is erroneous, identifies the significant facts that were not considered by the certifying agency, or identifies the regulatory provision that was improperly implied.

16. How long is the certification process from start to finish?

Certifying agencies must make decisions on applications for certification within 90 days of receiving from the applicant firm all information required. A certifying agency may extend this time period once, for no more than an additional 60 days, upon written notice to the firm, explaining fully and specifically the reasons for the extension.

17. Can I use the DBE application form to apply for airport concession as well?

Yes. If you do not have a DBE application, you may obtain the application at

18. Does DBE certification have reciprocity with other agencies, such as the Small Business Administration (SBA)?

No. Caltrans does not have any reciprocity with the SBA. The SBA 8(a) Program and the DBE Program are separate Federal certifications. One must apply with both SBA and Caltrans to attain both certifications.

19. Are my taxes and other personal information secured?

At Caltrans, we must comply with confidentiality requirements and we take this responsibility seriously. All files are kept behind locked doors, where only Certification staff has access.

20. I'm a prime contractor; how can I find DBE firms?

All certified firms are listed in the DBE Directory. You can access the database to find DBE firms in your area at <https://dot.ca.gov/programs/civil-rights/dbe-search>. If you are experiencing problems with accessing our database, you may call the Analyst of the Day at (916) 324-1700.

21. My business is certified as a DBE; where do I go from here?

As you know, other state departments, cities, and counties offer many opportunities for small businesses to bid for federally-funded contracts. For jobs currently out for bid, please visit Division of Contracts and Procurements website. For major projects, visit the Office Engineer website. If you're looking to bid with agencies other than Caltrans, you can find links to participating California Unified Certification Program agencies at <http://californiaucp.org>.

Being a small business in California offers many opportunities; not just with federal contracts, but state contracts as well. You may want to visit: Department of General Services website.

22. Can my DBE certification be suspended?

Yes. Regulatory changes effective November 3, 2014, (49 CFR, Part 26) provides authority to the certifying agencies, including Caltrans, to suspend a firm's DBE certification without a hearing when a certifying agency believes that one or more of the disadvantaged owners needed to meet the ownership and control requirements is incarcerated or died.

A certifying agency has authority to suspend a firm's DBE certification when there is adequate evidence to believe that there has been a material change in circumstances that may affect the eligibility of the DBE firm to remain certified; when the DBE fails to notify the recipient in writing of any material change in circumstances; or fails to timely file an affidavit of no change and supporting docs such as taxes.

23. What are effects of being suspended?

While suspended, a DBE may not be considered to meet a contract goal on a new contract, and any work it does on a contract received during the suspension shall not be counted toward a recipient's overall goal. The DBE may continue to perform under an existing contract executed before the DBE received a Notice of Suspension and may be counted toward the contract goal during the period of suspension as long as the DBE is performing a commercially useful function under the existing contract.

24. How do I get my suspension issue resolved?

Following receipt of the Notice of Suspension, if the DBE believes it is no longer eligible, it may voluntarily withdraw from the program, in which case no further action is required. If the DBE believes that its eligibility should be reinstated, it must provide to the recipient information demonstrating that the firm is eligible notwithstanding its changed circumstances. Within 30 days of receiving this information, the recipient must either lift the suspension and reinstate the firm's certification or commence a decertification action under §26.87 of this part. If the recipient commences a decertification proceeding, the suspension remains in effect during the proceeding.

25. Can I appeal the suspension?

The decision to immediately suspend a DBE is not appealable to the US Department of Transportation.

APPENDIX F – SAMPLE “DOING BUSINESS WITH” INFORMATION

MISSION STATEMENT

To increase participation and ensure that small, disadvantaged, women, minority, owned businesses are afforded an equal opportunity to compete in the City’s procurement process and help businesses grow.

BUSINESS DIVERSITY PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- Increase awareness of Business Diversity Programs
- Assist small, disadvantaged, women, minority, owned businesses grow
- Provide networking and business development assistance

WHAT IS THE DBE PROGRAM?

The DBE Program was established by the federal government to ensure women-and-minority owned businesses have the opportunity to participate in contracts financed in whole or in part by the U.S. Department of Transportation (49 CFR Part 26)

DBE PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- To ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of DOT assisted contracts
- To create a level playing field on which DBE’s can compete fairly for DOT assisted contracts
- To ensure that the DBE Program is narrowly tailored in accordance with applicable law
- To ensure that only firms that fully meet 49 CFR Part 26 eligibility standards are permitted to participate as a DBE
- To help eliminate barriers to the participation of DBE firms in DOT assisted contracts
- To assist the development of firms that can compete successfully in the market place outside the DBE Program

FOSTERING SMALL BUSINESS PARTICIPATION (49 CFR PART 26.39)

In 2012, a new element was added to the DBE Program intended to assist in leveling the playing field for small businesses. It is considered a race and gender-neutral element of the Department’s DBE Program.

CERTIFICATION ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

In order to become a certified DBE, a firm must be 51% or more owned and controlled by a socially and economically disadvantaged individual within the meaning of DOT regulations. Additional DBE certification criteria include:

- Firm must be a for profit, small business meeting SBE size standards
- Qualified owner(s) must have a personal net worth that does not exceed \$1.32 million
- Qualified owner(s) must be a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident.

APPLYING FOR DBE CERTIFICATION

First time applicants for DBE certification must complete and submit the application and related material to the certifying agency that is located closest to your business home office. Only submit one application to one agency.

WHEREAS, the City is required to develop a DBE goal every three years for its various upcoming projects using a statistically supportable methodology based on available DBE firms in the City's predetermined market area and have its governing body adopt the goal(s).

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRFIELD HEREBY RESOLVES:

Section 1. The City's DBE program update is hereby adopted and ordered to be filed with the city clerk.

Section 2. The City adopts a DBE goal of 4.73% for federally-funded USDOT projects covering the period October 1, 2023, through September 30, 2026.

Section 3. The city manager is hereby authorized to and directed to implement the DBE program as detailed in the adopted in the updated DBE program.


